Adolescent Health and School Start Times: Science and Strategies

The science is clear. High school days in Connecticut and across the nation tend to start too early. The American Medical Association, Centers for Disease Control, and American Academy of Pediatrics all agree and have released recommendations for high schools to start after 8:30 am to allow for sleep, health, and learning. But often implementation can seem daunting.

We invite you to attend a free half-day workshop on teen sleep on October 16 covering the science of sleep and school start times and strategies for handling bus routes, athletics, and other potential implementation challenges. The workshop runs from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm at Trinity College in Hartford, CT.

This workshop is intended for Superintendents of Schools, Transportation Directors, Board of Education members, school administrators, teachers and other school staff, athletic directors, parents, and other concerned community members.
